Art can help your children discover who they are and the innate gifts they possess.

I'm pretty sure it didn't take you long to find out that your precious baby (whether that baby is two or eight or seventeen) likes to experiment, push boundaries, bend (or break) the rules, and be his or her own unique self.

Thankfully, art provides the perfect vehicle to do these things.

Through the artistic process, kids and teens can spread their wings and even soar as they discover their gifts and talents, and ultimately, who they really are.


Here are even more reasons why art is important for kids and teens:

Art allows them to...

- explore their feelings and emotions reconcile conflicts
- become more self-aware
- manage and improve behavior
- develop their artistic skills
- improve their mental health
- reduce stress and anxiety
- gain self-confidence

- increase self-esteem
- improve their sense of wellbeing
- think outside the box
- express themselves creatively
- improve performance in other areas
- achieve personal insight
- receive tremendous pleasure

Gone are the days of putting art off week after week because now you see how the simple act of creating something will actually help your children improve in other areas of life. (It's more than an extracurricular activity.)



Cultivating Creativity in Your Children

Charlotte Mason said, "There are few subjects regarded with more respect and less confidence in our schools than this of Art. Of course, we say, children should have their artistic powers cultivated...but how is the question."

One of my favorite Picasso quotes is: "Every child is an artist. The problem is how to remain an artist once we grow up."

Have you ever noticed that little kids have no problem whatsoever with expressing their inner artist? They absolutely know that they are awesome, and they have no qualms with showing off their amazing artwork!

But then as they get older, they begin to compare themselves to others. They may begin to believe that maybe they're not as artsy as they once thought. They become self-conscious and worry that their work isn't good enough.

Eventually, if we don't intervene and encourage them, they grow up to be adults who think that they "don't have a creative bone in their body." They begin to live dry, unfulfilled lives devoid of creativity. They forget that they came from the Creator (and as Maya Angelou said) "trailing wisps of [His] glory."

I want to encourage you to become proactive in cultivating your kids' and teens' creativity. And I also want to encourage you to create with your kids. You'll find it so fulfilling and not only will you be making beautiful keepsakes for years to come, you'll also be making beautiful memories that will last a lifetime.

1. ENCOURAGE THEIR CREATIVITY

Imago Dei—Remind them that they are created in the image of God, the Ultimate Artist.

Creativity is in our DNA. We are made in the image of God, therefore, there is a spark of His creativity within each of us. Whether you realize it or not, whether you've developed it or not, you are creative. An each one of your children is creative.

Yes, there are some who seem to be born with more of a bent towards the artsy, but art is also a skill that can be learned. If you can learn to write, you can learn to draw. If you can learn an instrument, you can learn to paint. Any skill requires a learning curve and PRACTICE.

Encourage your kids to use their God-given creativity. Remind them on a regular basis that they are made in the image of God. They are creative, artistic, imaginative, and unique!

2. INVEST IN THEIR CREATIVITY

Provide them with a VARIETY OF ART SUPPLIES so they can explore and experiment with different mediums.

Don't limit them to only one or two mediums — provide them with a variety of supplies: acrylics, watercolors, markers, gel pens, charcoal pencils, oil pastels, etc. Not every kid is going to love chalk pastels or crayons. If you want your kids to develop their inner artists, then allow them to experiment with various media. And, please invest in quality art supplies.

Charlotte Mason said, "Boxes of cheap colours are to be avoided. Children are worthy of the best..." And I wholeheartedly agree!

If you're always buying bargain or value paints and cheap brushes, your kids won't be able to produce the greatest results. You don't have to buy "professional artist paints." Look for "student grade" art supplies, or spend an extra \$5 or \$10 for the better quality set.

3. FACILITATE THEIR CREATIVITY

Establish a regular time each week (or whatever works best for your family) to allow your kids to create. A lot of the members of our Masterpiece Society Studio have "Fine Arts Fridays."

Not only do they have it on their schedule, they have a designated area to keep the supplies so that they're accessible to their kids.

Keep the supplies in a special cart, cabinet or drawer, but make them accessible.

4. LIBERATE THEIR CREATIVITY

Give them FREEDOM to explore and experiment. Henri Matisse said, "Creativity takes courage." And artist, Julia Cameron, said, "Creativity flourishes when we have a sense of safety and self-acceptance."

By giving your child freedom to express his or her creative side, while offering them a "soft place to land" without fear of judgment or criticism, you add value to them and give them confidence to grow into their own unique person.

Even our beloved Charlotte said, "The art training of children should proceed on two lines. The child should begin both to **express himself** and **to appreciate** [art], and his appreciation should be well in advance of his power to express what he sees or imagines.

So basically, they need the freedom to express themselves creatively without fear of rejection AND they need to come in contact with great masterworks so that they can begin to appreciate them.

Which brings me to our next point:

5. INSPIRE THEIR CREATIVITY

Study the great master artists. How can your child begin to appreciate art if he or she has never been exposed to some of the greatest works of all time?

Charlotte Mason said, "We cannot measure the influence that one or another artist has upon the child's sense of beauty, upon his power of seeing, as in a picture, the common sights of life; he is enriched more than we know in having really looked at even a single picture."

It is so important that we allow our children to come in contact with beautiful art pieces. Art brings a sense of beauty to our lives. It helps us learn to really "see" and it greatly enriches our lives.

As we study under the great masters of art, learn about their lives, learn about their creative process, learn the "whys" behind their paintings or sculptures, experiment at incorporating their styles and techniques, our own artistic abilities will improve.

The more you study them, the more you'll find that many of the the "greats" were free thinkers who changed the world of art. This should give your kid or teen encouragement and freedom in his or her own creativity. It should instill a courage to pull from everything around them that inspires them and to incorporate it into their art.

Ideas on how to learn about the great master artists:

Museums – Visit your local art museum, and visit museums in different cities when you travel. Absolutely nothing will compare to coming in contact with the great masterpieces in real life.

The Internet – Virtual museums, Wikipedia, YouTube — there's a wealth of information at your fingertips! (I would definitely suggest that you screen and sensor all artwork before allowing your children to view.) Check out Masterpiece Curations our sister site with TONS of free art history and art enrichment for homeschooling families.

Books – Biographies on the master artists including their methods and techniques, as well as "coffee table" books that contain beautifully photographed images of their art.

Podcasts – My daughter and I created an art history podcast called, Masterpiece Makers, in which we take you on an "artsy tour" across the centuries as we get to know the great master artists and their most famous works.

Art Courses – The Masterpiece Society has quite a few master artist lessons in which we explore a little bit of art history, the lives of the artists, then create art inspired by their great masterpieces. There are probably others out there as well. The point is not only to learn about them, but also try out some of their techniques such as: (impasto, tache, alla prima, chiaroscuro, pointillism, etc.)

Art Expression, Art Appreciation, and Art History should never be dull and boring! You will cultivate a love of art and nurture creativity in your kids and teens if you'll follow these simple tips!



Think About What You Want to Accomplish This Year with Art

Now that you know just how awesome art is for your kids (and you, by the way) let's get to planning!

Whether you want a structured plan in which your kids will learn about the great master artists, training in various art techniques, or advanced lessons in the classical mediums for your teens, or whether you simply want your entire family to enjoy creating and have the freedom of art exploration, this planner will help for you!

Grab a pen and a cuppa, and let's get started...

Questions to Consider:

1. What do you want to accomplish this year?

(Examples: establishing a regular art study, a general art education, knowledge of art history plus recreating the works of the great master artists, learning how to mix different media, exploring the classical art media and techniques on a more advanced level, etc.)

2. What are the ages of your children?
3. Will you be doing art together as a family, or do you have a wide range of ages that would work better individually?
4. How often do you want to do art? Weekly? Bi-weekly? Monthly? Small projects multiple times a week? (Remember, your schedule will change constantly, so feel free to switch things up! Make art and creativity a part of your lifestyle. The most important thing is to be consistent and don't get overwhelmed.)
5. Do you have a designated day when you'll do art? (Write it in your main homeschool planner or calendar now.)
6. Do you have a designated area where you will do art?

7. Do you have all the art supplies your kids will need?
(Check the Masterpiece Society Studio Calendar for a list of suggested lessons for the month or determine the ones your family would like to do first, then add the supplies you'll need to your shopping list. See pages 38 and 39 of this planner for a general supply list.)

8. How will you organize your art supplies so that they don't take over your home? Where will you keep them? Are they easily accessible?

9. How will you display your kids (& your) artwork?

(Write it in your main homeschool planner or calendar now.)

10. What will you study in your homeschool over the next few months? Can you incorporate some art lessons with those studies?

(Examples: Nature walks – seasonal art courses, History – the artists that lived and created during that time or the art era, Literature – LiterARTure lessons, etc.)

11. What holidays do you celebrate? Check out our planning calendar of suggested traditional + weird holidays in the next section.
12. What are your child(ren)'s interests? (Examples: animals, nature, flowers, faces, etc.)
13. What art mediums are your older kids and teens interested in learning? (Examples: charcoal, watercolors, acrylics, oil pastels, etc.)

14. Which famous artist(s) or art eras would you like to learn more about this year?
15. Do you have an art museum nearby that you can visit? If so, do they have "homeschool days"? Why not invite a few homeschooling families and take a field trip for the day? (Write down the one(s) you know of, as well as families you'd like to invite.)

Phew! You did it! Now, instead of giving yourself another pat on the back, excuse yourself for half an hour, and create this month's Masterpiece Moms art project.

There's sooo much artsy goodness here for your kids (and you)! And in all honesty, there is enough art within this membership site to take your kids from Kindergarten all the way up to High School.

So to help you avoid overwhelm, we've put together this calendar with lesson suggestions for each month of the year. (Please note: this does not include every lesson within the membership, just a sampling.)

As a homeschooling mom for almost two decades, I completely understand that we homeschoolers don't ever want to be put in a box. That's why you and your kids <u>are always free to do any course or lesson you desire</u>. But if you'd like a little more structure or a few suggestions now and then, let this calendar help you!

Simply print it out and add it to your homeschool planner or post it on your fridge for inspiration throughout the year.

How the Calendar is Organized:

- Monthly: The lessons are organized by <u>month</u> to give you ideas for Art in your homeschool. Included are seasonal courses, plus holiday lessons within that particular month.
- Sequentially: If you'd rather follow a <u>sequential</u> order for the more advanced courses such as, <u>Mixing with the Masters</u>, or <u>Art School</u>, we've organized those for your older kids as well.
- Color-coded: You will also notice that we've <u>color-coded</u> the lessons to help with age suggestions for the courses. However, as you may already know, most of our art courses can be adapted to fit the needs of the entire family. Below is the color key we use:

• GREEN: Grades K thru 2nd

• BLUE: Ages 8 and up

PURPLE: Ages 10 and upORANGE: Ages 13 and up

• PINK: Moms

Consider the ages of your children:

- Are they a bit on the younger side? Early or middle elementary? If so, I encourage you to stick with the K-2 art courses (listed in green on calendar), step-by-step drawing lessons, and with assistance, some lessons in the seasonal, holiday, and abstract courses (listed in blue on calendar).
- Are they upper elementary to early middle school? If so, any of the seasonal, holidays, abstract, and pet courses (listed in blue on calendar) and even the Mixing with the Masters courses (listed in purple on calendar) will be great for them. Of course, they're welcome to do the art for younger kids (green) if you think they'd enjoy them.
- Are they preteen to teens? The sky's the limit with them let them
 choose from any courses they'd like: seasonal, holidays, abstract,
 and pet courses (listed in blue on calendar), and the Mixing with
 the Masters courses (listed in purple on calendar), and don't forget
 the Art School courses (listed in orange on calendar) which we
 created especially for this age group.
- Are your kids everywhere in between? If you have a mix of ages,
 they can work separately or let them all work together on projects.
 Your younger children can do as much as they can, while older kids
 and teens can embellish to their hearts' content. Even preschoolers
 can color (or paint) the PDF templates alongside their older
 siblings.
- And don't forget about yourself! While you'll have loads of fun creating alongside your kids in any of our courses, we have a special section for you: Masterpiece Moms (listed in pink on calendar). Don't neglect to take time for yourself to refill your cup. "Mom time" is essential for a happy, well-balanced you.


